SEN Register

The teaching assistants have been busy working with their young people as key workers and checking in to update pupil passports. The key worker aspect of the role allows the teaching assistants to act as a safe adult for all children who are on the SEND register. They aim to meet with their students every term and as part of this process will make contact with all parents and carers to feedback on this pupil catch up.

After half term, we will also be enhancing the co-curricular offer for our SEND students. We will be introducing a series of targeted clubs before school, meet and greets and additional after school curriculum plus sessions. 








A spotlight on The Graduated Approach:



The graduated approach prompts schools to take action to remove barriers to learning and put effective special educational provision in place. All children regardless of any special educational needs receive a "universal" level of support to meet their needs that includes Quality First Teaching and Learning, along with services that are available to all children (e.g., GPs, dentists etc.). Where a potential barrier to learning is observed, the graduated approach is used.

Assess - Teachers, working with the SENDCO, discuss the child's needs and any parental concerns.

Plan - A plan of additional support is devised to overcome barriers and is discussed with parents.

Do – The plan is implemented in the classroom

Review – The impact of additional support is reviewed and if a particular strategy has not been effective, the graduated approach cycle is repeated.
