














ROALD DAHLS Atilda THE MUSICAL JR.






























Broadcasting All Things Bookish!

FUSION LEARNING

Louie H has been completing alternative provision at Engineered Learning. In this article, we showcase Louie's work and ask - what does this opportunity involve and what have you learnt so far?

I have attended the placement for over 15 weeks, from 9.30am until 2pm. I am enjoying the opportunity to do something which is different to school. I now feel more motivated at school. The alternative provision is at Engineered Learning, and Dan and Chloe teach us.

I have made a money box, I cut the shape out with a bandsaw and cutting disc, ensured it was fully marked up, found the middle point, created small pilot holes with a center punch, and then used a pistol drill, increasing from 3mm, then 5mm to 7mm to avoid the drill jamming.

I used a welding bay, and welded the top and bottom. After allowing it to cool I used an angle grinder to polish it, and finally painted the piece. We worked out how many pound coins it would hold.... 972 pound coins in total!

I enjoy using Maths in the work place - GCSE D&T, Physics and Maths have really helped my understanding of doing mathematical engineering tasks. I love measuring and cutting using these skills, and I am also following engineering sketches which involve lots of mental mathematics!

I have also made an engineering try-square using a laser cut out. I knocked off the slag with a hammer and chisel, and then used a sanding disc, angle grinder and polishing discs to remove surface level rust.

My alternative provision has allowed for me to develop new skills, and has helped me to decide what I want to do after school. I feel a lot more eager to learn now, as I can see the practical benefits of my studies.

My future plans are to work at Aztec oils as an apprentice.



Uniform Reminder

We have a uniform policy that reflects the professional attitude we aspire our students to have and all staff are instructed to challenge students regarding their uniform and appearance during the day. High academic standards and therefore being successful is built upon the solid foundation of day to day positive habits which includes uniform and appearance.

We believe the benefits of a professional uniform policy include creating a sense of community, reduces the potential for bullying, increases safety, prepares students for employment and improves study ethic. The full uniform expectations can be found on the school website under the 'parents' section but could we please draw your attention to the following points:

- Black trainers are NOT allowed black shoes only
- Hoodies and sweaters are NOT allowed these will be confiscated from students
- Leggings are NOT permitted plain black school trousers or knee length skirt only which can be ordered from logo leisurewear
- Blazers and ties must be worn these can be removed during hot weather in the summer
- Unnaturally coloured hair is not permitted
- False eyelashes and false nails are not permitted

All students will be expected to be in full school uniform on the first day back after Easter. We would greatly appreciate it if all parents/carers could support the school in ensuring their child is looking smart and ready for learning by replacing any items that are missing or no longer fit.
